We One Action Network (WOAN) have followed in the quest to assist Kenyans living within the informal settlement of Kibera. Industrialized countries such as USA, China and many European countries have faced dire economic challenges and citizens accepting wearing a mask, practicing social distance and proper hand-washing. # LOOK BACK 2020 TEAMEnvironment Kenya

Early 2020, WOAN and TEAMEnvironment Kenya (TEK) entered into a sponsorship agreement through the end of September 2020. Through TEK programs and collaborative efforts with schools, local agencies and other leaders, TEK filled a void with our most vulnerable girls not having sanitary pads. Reaching the goal to distribute ten- thousand sanitary pads at various locations ranging from informal settlement such as Kibera, street families and village areas of Kenya was an remarkable achievement.

During pad distribution events, TEK leaders offered mentorship to young girls, discuss female health & hygiene and invited local leaders to send positive messages. Men all over the world understand very little about menstruation and Kenyan men are no different. TEK also encouraged boys and men to join the conversation that range from gender equality, inappropriate behavior (i.e. shaming) and sexual abuse so they understand more what it means to be a woman.

This same time in April, the NY Times ran a story about the global food crisis that highlighted Asha Jaffar, the founder of Kibra Food Drive (KFD). As background - Asha was born and raised in Kibera, she also attended primary and secondary schools in Kibera before completing her degree in journalism. As a Kenyan woman, Asha has such a tremendous story of perseverance and determination; WOAN is extremely excited to support Asha's vision moving forward.

### BACK TO SCHOOL

Kenyan schoolchildren in grades four, eight and twelve returned to class in October 2020, ending months-long closure of all educational institutions in the country designed to slow the spread of the coronavirus. Many nations including Western and European countries have grappled with how to reopen schools safely amid the pandemic. In Kenya, where public and private schools were shut after the first COVID-19 case was confirmed in March 2020, the closures have been among the longest in Africa. The three levels that went back to school prepped for national standardized exams that were postponed. The Kenyan government later decided all students would return to school on January 4th, 2021. Unfortunately, many school structures lack basic necessities forcing students and educators outside under trees as a solution.

The Minister of Education, under the guidance of the Minister of Health, who oversee more that 17 million Kenyan students. The report that most students have missed six months of school and pleaded for organizations to donate supplies such as masks instead of cash due to the vast mismanagement of government procurement and resources. This is a very harsh reality for many parents, students and educators as the numbers of child agencies has seen a sharp increase in violence against children, child marriage, child pregnancy and child labor. Some 1.6 million children rely on school meals that stopped in March 2020 as many families do not have devices, wifi or internet access that enable children to take part in remote learning.

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### NEW TO THE TEAM

Due to the adverse impacts of the coronavirus pandemic in 2020, We One Action Network (WOAN) was forced to pivot our scope to join with many other organizations to fill as many gaps as possible. In 2021, WOAN will gradually refocus our attention back to supporting educational programs, students, and educators within the informal settlement of Kibera. Regardless of which country – WOAN firmly believes that our youth are offered a better chance at life through education, mentorship and creating environments for self-expression. To help WOAN further aligned in these areas, it is with great pleasure to announce the following team changes.

I am pleased to announce Julie Poynter as our Program Consultant. She first began her involvement with WOAN in 2018 as a donor. After listening to my vision of WOAN's goals, successes, challenges and aspirations; she would often offer her advice. Julie attended Indiana State University and attained her Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education. # **COMING 2021**



### | DID YOU KNOW?

Wangari Maathai was born on April 1, 1940 in Nyeri, Kenya and passed on September 25, 2011 in Nairobi, Kenya. She was a Kenyan politician and environmental activist who was awarded the 2004 Nobel Prize for Peace, becoming the first African woman to win a Nobel Prize. Her work was often considered unwelcoming to some in Kenya where her outspokenness constituted stepping far outside traditional gender roles.

Dr. Maathai was partially educated in the United States at Benedictine College (B.S. in Biology) and at the University of Pittsburgh (M.S. in Biology). She was one of 300 students who were benefactors of the late US President John F. Kennedy's initiative to create educational opportunities for East African students. She later received her Ph. D in Biology from the University of Nairobi. She became the first African woman in either East or Central Africa to earn a doctorate. She began teaching in the Department of Veterinary Anatomy at the University of Nairobi after graduation and in 1977 she became chair of the department.

While working with the National Council of Women of Kenya, Dr. Maathai developed the idea that village women could improve the environment by planting trees to provide a fuel source and slow the processes of deforestation and desertification. The Green Belt Movement, an organization she founded in 1977, has planted some 30 million trees by the early 21st century. Leaders of the Green Belt Movement established the Pan African Green Belt Network in 1986 in order to educate world leaders about conservation and environmental improvement. As a result of the movement's activism, similar initiatives were begun in other African countries, including Tanzania, Ethiopia, and Zimbabwe.
