We are pleased to announce we have crossed a milestone in the history of our organization. As of August 25, 2023, We One Action Network (WOAN) will have completed five years of helping vulnerable youths, students, and teachers in underserved communities and villages in Kenya.

What began as a mission trip to visit the largest informal settlement in Africa (Kibera), quickly moved to fundraise to support schools. WOAN has now grown to sponsor an elementary school in Kibera while supporting various initiatives that promotes livelihoods outside of the classroom. WOAN continues to collaborate with various leaders in the USA and Kenya to stay connected as the landscape of charitable work is ever-changing.

The last five years have been amazing!

- Offered scholarships to allow deserving students to continue their education.

<u>Cultivate International</u> (CI) belief is that solutions to poverty, injustice, and inequality must be led by community insiders - those who intimately know their community and share the same ethnic socioeconomic, and cultural background. Their programs are designed to address the gap in access and inclusion of community insiders as changemakers in the global philanthropic sector.

Cl's motto is simple; "We can only achieve our goals of making this world better for those on the margins when the strength of local communities is our priority, and when the people who intimately know their community are the ones leading change".

In April of 2023, We One Action Network (WOAN) partnered with C1 to offer partial scholarships for <u>Leadership Training</u> held in Kenya with various community leaders. The training was for anyone who leads an NGO, CBO, or other community organization, their staff, volunteers, or those who wish to start their community program. The workshops introduced relevant topics of project management, how to design and build a program, fundraising, and program evaluation.

Adolescent girls and boys from poor or disadvantaged communities are vulnerable to and are more likely to experience early sexual debut or forced into early marriages, hence thrusting them into young parenthood. In most cases, pregnant teengers and young mothers are often unable to complete primary or secondary education, a statistic that diminishes their potential to find gainful employment.



There is an imbalance between what the job market demands and the level of skills and training among the youth. Most youths in Kibera, cannot afford to proceed beyond secondary school due to lack of funds. Those who venture into businesses cannot sustain the businesses due to a lack of sufficient knowledge and a lack of funds.

During 2023, We One Action Network (WOAN) partnered with <u>Garden of Hope Foundation</u> (GOHF) to train 18 youths on entrepreneurial strategies and entrepreneurship and adveloping personal entrepreneurial skills, volth are GoHF's Kibera and Homabay branches. Nipe Tabasamu Na Upendo



Nine Tabasamu Na Upendo (NTNU) initiative was founded in 2018. They are a Community-Based Organization that aims at giving Hope and Transformation to the community by equipping them with Knowledge, Resources, and Motivation. Their area of focus is the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) formed by the United Nations (UN).

SDGs are the footprint for NTNU's work and focus on a sustainable future for vulnerable youth. They address global challenges faced with poverty, inequality, climate, and environmental degradation. NTNU's mission through SDGs also includes quality education, good health, gender equality, and zero hunger.

Re-imagining New Communities

Children are the most impacted by violent conflict. However, they are rarely engaged in the implementation of solutions to prevent and transform violent conflict. NationSi's urban areas and most of the rural areas of Kenya are riddled with violent conflict. They lack safe spaces for children to recreate, play and learn away from school. Lack of attention and mental support causes an enormous impact on their emotional development, social functioning, and academic performance. Some have developed post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) due to withessing violence within their homes or communities.



In 2023, We One Action Network (WOAN) will partner with <u>Re-Imagining New Communities</u> (RNC) to sponsor three training cohorts that specifically target training teachers on how to manage negotiations and conflict that leads to fair resolutions. Impacted communities are <u>Vihiga & Kakamega</u> counties completed in April 2023. Trans-Nzoia, Kakamega, and Nairobi counties are coming later in 2023.

Children Led Community Peace Labs (CLCP) was first launched in 2021. CLCP aims to provide a safe space where students aged 7 to 12 living in conflict-affected communities can learn and practice peacebuilding skills. CLCP supports, mentors, and equips children to be more resilient and aware of unpredictable chronic and political outbreaks of violence that may erupt within their way of life.



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Shine Academy Educational Center



Shine Academy Educational Center (SAEC) is a private pre-primary and lower primary school. It is the only sponsored school for We One Action Network (WOAN) that manages a continuous education program through financial grants.

SAEC is located within the informal settlement of Kibera and operates on a small property of two buildings. SAEC's fourth classroom was constructed in April 2023, as we anticipated increasing our student population of 79 in 2023. SAEC will grow to 100 students in 2024.

SAEC's academic programs are led by four registered teachers, one parent-volunteer, and one school Accountant. This staff is under the direction of the Founder, Head Teacher, and Director Winnie Shikutwa. Winnie is a professionally trained primary school teacher. He earned a Certificate in Counseling and a Diploma in Human Resources from Kenya Institute of Management. She also earned a Bachelor's Degree in Project Management from Daystar University.

'Together For Africa Organizations (TOFA) purpose is to provide solutions that can help young people become empowered, both socially and economically, therefore, presenting themselves as part of the solution to deal with and reduce the high rates of poverty. Leadership and entrepreneurship training is our core mandate as an organization as we seek to provide solutions that help young people become empowered as future leaders.



In East Africa, it is estimated that over 60% of young people, aged 18 and 35 years suffer from identity crises and are ill-equipped for the marketplace. At the onset of TOFAs various programs, they conduct conferences that act as a platform to help inspiring youths better understand the pain points of leadership but also share encouraging stories.

In April 2023, We One Action Network (WOAN) partnered with TOFA to sponsor their Youth Leadership Conference and brought in a variety of community leaders and a diverse audience of leaders, students, and quest speakers.

Violence against girls and women is unfortunately not a new phenomenon and it is embedded in every country and in every society throughout the world. Whether sexual, gender based, emotional or physical; violence against women most often goes unreported. The World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that one-third (27%) of women regardless of race, creed or culture between the age of 15-49 years have been in a relationship that they have been subjected to some form violence by their intimate partner.

There are several factors for the reasons why. These range from lack of education, gender equality acceptance, alcoholism, harmful masculines behaviors and history of exposure as a child. The most publicized examples of violence against women in 2021 are the brutal and senseless murders of Olympic-Medalist Agnes Jebet Tirop (Kenya) and Travel-influencer Gabby Petito (USA).

We One Action Network (WOAN) events, projects or initiatives are inclusive to listening <u>and</u> educating young boys and girls on inappropriate actions and behavior.
